FAR SIDE of the WORLD – III

After beginning his career as an apprentice at the Derby China Works, **THOMAS PARDOE** became a leading decorator of porcelain in Wales, first at Swansea and later at the Nantgarw pottery works. The rare surviving pieces of Nantgarw porcelain, produced in the relatively short period of ten years between 1813 and 1822, are considered today to be among the most valuable artefacts ever produced in Wales, and are among the most notable examples of British Porcelain ever made. His second marriage to **SARA ANN ALLUM** at Swansea in December 1802 produced five children over the next 17 years. Thomas died in 1823 so did not live to see his and Sara's fourth child and eldest daughter **ALICE BURFORD PARDOE** marry in about 1837, **BENJAMIN WILLIAM RAWLINGS** who was a London solicitor with a London residence or rooms quite close to the "Old Bailey" at St Martins Lane, Middlesex, London in 1851. According to a granddaughter, Margaret Rawlings, Benjamin was a lawyer or solicitor to the queen's court—during the reign of Victoria—and was highly thought of until something took place in court, and he was disgraced and disbarred. The family lived in Romford and their address was 129 St. John Street, Romford, Essex, England. It was here that their eight surviving children grew up.

- iii. **BLANCHE BURTENSWOOD** [1841-1897]. who married **WALTER DUNCAN**. There were no children.
- iv. **SARAH FRANCES** [1843-1895] never married, suffered from ill health, and went to live near her sister Alice in France she died there in May 1895 at Saint Sabre.
- v. **CLAUDE CORBYN** [1844-1905] went to New Zealand in 1863, fought in the Maori Wars and then returned to England and married **SARAH ANNIE THURGOOD** in 1885. They returned to New Zealand the same year. Claude was accompanied by his brother Reginald and his family. Claude died 5 March 1905, Towai, Bay of Islands, NZ.
- vi. **PERCIVAL CHARLES** [1846-1916] who married **HELEN REDDING**, they had four sons and three daughters. One son **LEON HUGH** was the first of this family to leave for Canada. Percival and Helen and their children, **REGINALD**, **NOEL** and **CONSTANCE**, left for Canada three years later. Of this branch there are many descendants in Canada. Their daughter **MARGARET AMY** stayed in England and married **CHARLES GENEVER**. There were three children to this marriage, **MARGARET** who lived in Guildford, **PERCY**, and lastly **REGINALD** who lived in Scotland.
- vii. **CONSTANCE MARY** [1849-1876] who married her cousin **LLEWELLYN T. SULLY** and died giving birth to their only child Lily Constance Sully [1876-1952].
- viii. **NOEL WILLIAM** b. [1850-1851] who died an infant at 12 months.

- ix. **REGINALD** [1851-1932] married his cousin **MARY ALLUM SULLY**. Together with their family, and in the company of recently married Claude and Sarah they sailed for New Zealand in 1885. Claude and Sarah had 7 children, Reginald and Mary had 11 children, consequently there are many descendants in New Zealand. See the "*Pardoe - Rawlings Family Register*". Claude died in 1905 and Reginald died in 1932 in New Zealand.

THE FRENCH AND AMERICAN CONNECTION

As already noted Alice Allum settled in France with her husband **FRANCISQUE BELOUD** where she had one son Leon Gustave Beloud and coped with a number of miscarriages or infant deaths before Francisque died leaving her to fend for herself as a widowed mother. Reading between the lines it would appear that marrying her second husband Amaus Cannac in 1880, or maybe the new baby in the house, caused a rift in the relationship with her now 17-year-old son Leon, for about a year later he packed his bags, left home without warning and travelled to Canada where he married in British Columbia and later moved down the coast to California. Following is a register for him, the research and details of which have been put together by Linda Lowrey of Hamilton, Ontario, Canada.

Back in France, Alice and Amaus Cannac had a son Rene. Born about 1881 who after his education was completed went on to become a doctor who served during the Great War [1914-1918], and in his sixties again during World War II [1940-1945]. Rene used to correspond with his New Zealand cousins and also did some basic family history, probably for his own benefit in sorting out the various families. His father died early at the age of fifty, after just twelve years of blissful marriage. So again Alice was left to support another son through his teenage years and also care for her invalid sister Sarah Frances who came to stay quite close. Alice died at Lille, aged sixty-two in 1902.

In about 1970, toward the end of his life, cousin Dr. Rene Cannac, who it is understood remained unattached throughout his life, recorded a few memories of his mother's family.

Of Benjamin William Rawlings, my grandfather, I know little, he was a solicitor. He wrote poems, generally and sad like this one I found in a little bound collection and translated. The book is initialised A. B. Pardoe, my grandmother, the poem is signed B. W. Rawlings 1836.

“Don't cry for the dead
Who rest in the calm
The spark of life has left them
But so have their pains

Why delay and groan
When death loosens the ties
Which make you dread life.”

Of my grandmother, I know only one thing, she was very good, according to her granddaughter, my cousin Margaret Rawlings, (Percival's daughter) I add that she was a pretty woman, from the portrait in her possession.

Alice Allum Rawlings, my mother, was born 31st December 1838 at Clerkenwell, 129 St. Johns Street, Middlesex; she had many ordeals, Leon Beloud, the son from her 1st marriage, left his Country for the United States without warning her and all the others died young. She married her 2nd husband Joseph Amaus Lucieu Cannac in the Church of Leyton, Essex and lost him also, although he was only 50 years old, after 12 years of marriage. 12 years of perfect harmony.

In the same collection I noted down and translated what my mother wrote in 1847 at the age of 9:

“O call my brother
So that he will come back near me
I cannot play without him.”

My mother had her sister Frances (apparently an invalid) come to live near to her and looked after her like a child until her death.

My mother was pious and dutiful, I remember the joy she gained from being able to get (to) the Wesley Church at Boulogne services. I also loved this simple church where one person washed and prayed aloud, then another, then still more people.

Maybe I loved it so much because of the service and the prayers (were) in English because I've only ever been able to pray in English!

John Wesley [1703-1791], son of an Anglican preacher was priest, then, with his brother Charles started and managed a scientific / religious society that their friends ironically called “Methodist:”, he went to Georgia, found peace in his soul in 1738 under the influence of the Moravians, came back to the source of the Reformation, and brought about a formidable religious movement.

John Wesley gave nearly 40,000 sermons, mostly open air, wrote more than 200 works / treatises and distributed more than 30,000 English books. His brother Charles wrote 6,500 hymns and poetry books.

Methodism is characterised by the care of the Christian life, the evangelisation of crowds, particularly the western world, indifference with regard to culture and universal priesthood. Actually in those days there only existed 5 Methodist communities.

My name is Leon, but call me ‘Bud’ French. I was born in 1935, the only child of Phyllis Gertrude Rawlings who married Fenwick French just four years prior to him going overseas in 1939, only to arrive home from the war later with another girl in tow! I grew up, particularly during the war years, mostly with my grandfather Rawlings, whose name was also Leon, in Victoria, British Columbia, Canada.

I met Albert Mayoh as a boy. He was the brother of my grandfather’s wife Edith, and married my grandfather’s older sister Helen Constance Rawlings. Albert was a farmer, at Waldron, Saskatchewan, but would come and visit each Fall after the prairie crop was in. Seemed he stayed for months. We went crabbing, clamming together at my grandparent’s cabin, in Sooke Harbour, outside Victoria, on the southern end of Vancouver Island.

Albert Mayoh’s sister Edith who married my grandfather Leon Hugh Rawlings was really mean to me when my mother and I lived with them during the second world war (1942-43). I disliked her immensely and she was institutionalised in the late 50’s early 60’s and died when 62 if I remember correctly.

Leon Hugh and Edith lived originally in Waldron, Saskatchewan and my Mom was born there 10 April, 1908. She had tuberculosis but recovered. I think that was part of the reason they moved to Nakusp BC. My grandfather became very wealthy there in the construction business, i.e. roads, railroad, bridges, boats, tunnels, wharves, lumber, home construction etc. He was the organiser, bidder (tendered) etc. He brought in phones, and started an electricity company, etc., in Nakusp. In about 1925 his working partner and the boss on their construction sites, was killed by a lightning strike.

According to the 1901 English Census my grandfather’s dad, Percival Rawlings, was employed as a Stock Exchange Jobbers Clerk, and lived at Walthamshaw, Essex. Four years later, and three years after his son Leon had emigrated, Percival and his family arrived April 1905, in Dubuc, (later

Waldron, east of Regina in Saskatchewan) and set up house 14 miles North of Dubuc on allotted ground. The climate was tough, the average in winter was -22°C, the ground covered in snow. They, especially the sons, spent the winter hunting wolves. Three years later, a new town, Waldron, three miles from their house, rose out of the ground, trains stopped there, a post office was opened and Percival Rawlings was named its director. Later he lived with his son Leon and Edith in Nakusp—lived well into his 90's—I have his gold fob-watch chain with a cross on the end for button-holing the fob to his waistcoat. There is a large book—“Port of Nakusp”—with a picture of him wearing the attached fob.

My grandfather moved to Victoria, Vancouver Island, about 1929—just before the depression—bought a six acre estate and built a large home for his family. This land is in the middle of Victoria now and all subdivided. My grandfather continued to build houses and renovate large homes into apartments in choice Victoria areas, more I think to keep busy. As a boy I'd go to his basement workshop in the fall and there would be wooden toys all painted and prepared to give away. They were gifts to the big orphanage in Victoria at Christmas. He was a Mason, Shriner and past potentate of the Shrine for all of British Columbia. He was also very active in the Shriners Hospital in Portland, Oregon, secretary for many years for the Shrine band (like me he was not musical). He was really my dad because my own left in 1939 to go to the war and came home after it was over with his girlfriend and divorced mum, so I never really got to know him.

As far as my grandfather's youngest brother Percival is concerned I know he lived in Victoria and I saw him periodically when out riding my bike, but never at grandfather's. I just have to say, that for brothers, they weren't that close.

My uncle, Cecil Rawlings followed in my grandfather's footsteps, served 1939-1945 in the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) doing Atlantic escort work. After his return, he married Vera Catton and became a very well-known businessman in the area, owning an Esso gas station on the inner harbour of Victoria. Manufactured oil stoves and accessories, owned limousines and buses that went to the airport, had the biggest taxi company with some 70 cabs in the Victoria area, called 'C&C taxi', for Cecil Rawlings and Cecil Rhodes his partner. He was a character and bucked the system. I really liked him and worked for him when I was getting my teaching degree. We had some good parties too. An absolute shame he was killed in a plane crash on Vancouver Island in 1960. I totally lost track of his daughter Linda, who was about 12 years younger than me, except she married a fisherman and lived on the boat. Jo-Anne and I were closer. Jo-Anne married Daryl Beere who worked his way up in the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP). I was a teacher and school principal for 10 years up north and basically lost track. I understand Jo-Anne and Daryl moved to North Vancouver after years of RCMP moves, and where Daryl became the senior investigator for the College of Physicians & Surgeons of British Columbia.

Bud French continues, I married Barbara Millicent Smith in November 1954, and had 4 children, Michael Fenwick French, born 28 June, 1955; Lorrie Janine French, born, 26 August 1956; Guy Alexander French, born, 5 September, 1958; and Ronald Leon French, born, 14 November, 1959.

Michael Fenwick (Mike) French married Cassandra (Cassie), and they had my grandson Scott French, born August 31, 1980. Scott has 2 children Braydon and Ethan. Mike and Cassie divorced and Mike married Angela.

Because she was unfaithful, Barbara and I were divorced 18 June 1967. Although I was awarded all of the children, Barbara came and pleaded for Lorrie. As a result, my daughter Lorrie Janine French has hated me since she was 10 years old and eventually came under government care as a result of her stepfather's sexual abuse. According to my son, Ron, she has had a terrible life. She had 2 children, one mongoloid, then she divorced and lives somewhere in Victoria.

Guy Alexander French is a school teacher and married to Kelly. Their daughter Jenaya Eilish French was born 7 August, 1996. She graduated from High School in 2012 and is now taking teacher training on a soccer scholarship. She is a good athlete, as was Guy and myself. Guy and Kelly live in Whiterock, B.C., south of Vancouver, about 2 miles from the US border. Their house has a beautiful view of the Pacific Ocean.

Ronald Leon French is a fire chief, Central Saanich, a suburb of Victoria. Ron has done well for himself, married Rhonda Thorne and they have two children, Brett & Blair French, who were born in Kelowna. Brett attends school near Ottawa, Ontario, and Blair works in a warehouse in Saanich. Ron and Rhonda divorced and Ron remarried about 3 years ago to Natalie. She has a teenage boy who Ron is step-fathering. He seems to like him and things have settled in. He's been working hard and has just completed overseeing the building of a \$16.5 million fire-hall for Central Saanich, officially opened 2014. He was involved in helping after hurricane Katrina (New Orleans) and Haiti. He is a diving instructor and is in charge of HAZMAT for the Lower Island—in case you are unaware, HAZMAT is all the weird stuff firemen face from drug labs to bad smoke fires to acid spills, etc. As you can see, I'm very proud of him.

Finally, I remarried in 1969 in Kelowna, B.C. to Elaine Sladen, no children, but she was a great step-mother for the boys. A school teacher and a good one, however we divorced in 1980. I've done a lot of things; 22 years teaching—one as a teacher, four as a vice-principal, 17 as a principal, 18 years as a real estate sales person. I resigned teaching in 1980 (the year of my divorce). I have driven highway trucks (Alaskan Hwy), fire trucks, logging trucks (2 summers), etc., etc.

I had a heart attack in 1985 (49 years old) and had double bypass surgery. I was back again in 1997 for 5 bypasses, and touch wood, now have good health. I have volunteered in many organisations, played hockey and refereed for 5 seasons for up to age 21 players, played and coached Baseball (my favourite), Volley ball, Slo-pitch Softball, (Canadian champs in the 55 and over League played in Detroit Michigan), plus Canadian football, Rugby, Lacrosse – anyone for tiddly winks!

THE RAWLINGS FAMILY FORTUNES IN NEW ZEALAND

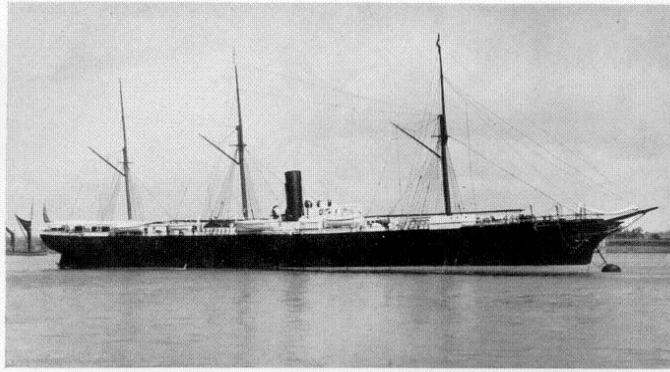
CLAUDE RAWLINGS was born 9th March 1844 in Romford Essex England. He left in 1863 aged 19 for New Zealand as a steerage passenger on the sailing ship “*ALOE*”, Captain Tregoning was in command (departing from Gravesend on 5th February, 1863 the ship arrived in Auckland 7th June 1863. (From “*The Daily Southern Cross*” newspaper of, 8 June, 1863) Claude went gold prospecting, probably in Otago, If he made his fortune, it was probably only enough to get him back home again.

He took part in the Waikato Maori wars, fighting in the Battle of Rangiriri and Meremere. The Waikato Militia records show details of **CLAUDE** and that 50 acres of land was allocated to him. (To date no Certificate of Title can prove ownership to the land and it probably reverted back to the Crown when he returned to England. There is a Rawlings Street in Melville, Hamilton which Uncle Leonard thought to be the land in question. More research is needed.) **CLAUDE** became wounded and was discharged 3 or 4 years later

He tried his luck once more in the Thames and Otago Goldfields before returning to London. He and his younger brother **REGINALD RAWLINGS** went into business as Advertising Agents leasing offices from A. G. Hughes in Chancery Lane London. (Copy of Lease document held by Anne Bannister)

In 1885 he married **SARAH ANNIE THURGOOD** who came from Enfield in North London. Very soon after their mother died Claude persuaded his brother Reginald to leave with him and on the 25th November, 1885 the two brothers embarked on the steamship “*GARONNE**” a vessel of 3,846 tonnes, with their wives, Reginald's four children and a governess Miss Paul. The cost for the whole group was £300 (pounds). Their plans seem to have been rather haphazard for when they left

England their intention was to go to Tasmania, and this is how they were listed on the ship's documents, but somewhere during the voyage they were persuaded to continue on to New Zealand!



GARONNE, 3,800 tons
First of the regular Orient Liners to touch at Table Bay (1878)

*One of four sister ships : LUSITANIA, CHIMBORAZO, CUZCO and GARONNE, all built during 1871, designed with clipper bows and 3 masts, length 382.1ft x beam 41.4ft (116,45m x 12,62m), one funnel, three masts, iron construction, single screw with a speed of 12 knots. There was accommodation for 72-1st, 92-2nd and 265-3rd class passengers. Chartered in 1877 and then bought in 1878, by Frederick Green & Company and Anderson, Anderson & Company, from the Pacific Steam Navigation Company, and placed in the ownership of the newly formed Orient Steam Navigation Company Limited (the Orient Line). Started a regular service to Australia, with considerable impact as the 4 were the largest and fastest steamers seen in the country at that time. In 1889 the ships CHIMBORAZO and GARONNE introduced off-season cruising to the Northern Scandinavian capitals, a highly significant innovation.

The 1885 Orient Line ticket that took the two Rawlings brothers and their families from the Royal Albert dock, London (Gravesend – 26 Nov. 1885) via Adelaide (Jan. 7) to disembark at Melbourne, Australia (Jan. 10, 1886). It appears from Australian newspaper reports that the "SS Garonne" turned around at Sydney departing on January 30, 1886 for the return trip to London. A NZ Union steamship company vessel, the *Manapouri* that sailed from Melbourne on the 12th, carried them, via Hobart, Tasmania, and the New Zealand ports, of Bluff, & Dunedin, Lyttelton, Wellington, Napier, Gisborne to their final destination of Auckland on January 26, 1886. Because the Hobart to Auckland leg of their journey was an afterthought, they may have travelled as un-named steerage passengers for their names have not been found in any reported passenger lists in the 6 to 8 weeks following their arrival in Melbourne.

THE R.M.S.S. GARONNE.

The R.M.S.S. Garonne, of the Orient line, arrived at 9 o'clock yesterday morning from London with mails, passengers, and cargo. On arrival she was cleared inward by Mr. T. D. Hammond, senior immigration officer, and, after transhipment of mails, Pilot Gafford took her alongside the railway pier, Williamstown. The Garonne on this occasion has added another to her list of successful passages. Heavy weather was encountered at the commencement, but, in spite of this, and the usual detentions en route, the run out from Plymouth to Port Phillip has been accomplished in 12 days. The mails, exclusive of those transhipped at Greenslip for Gaelong, were landed yesterday in 36 days. A call was made at Naples on this voyage, the quarantine restrictions, as between Italy and Egypt, having been removed. Some 20 Italian immigrants embarked at Naples. The passenger list from Plymouth showed 48 saloon, 88 second saloon, and 203 third cabin and steerage. The destinations, and numbers were as follow:—Adelaide, 31; Melbourne, 144; and Sydney, 224. The health of all was good on the way out, and there was neither sickness nor mortality. The passengers enjoyed themselves after the usual fashion at sea, and there was no lack of the customary entertainments and amusements. Captain Tilt is again in command, but the former chief officer, Mr. Brymer, has been succeeded by Mr. J. Smith, formerly of the Abergeldie and Lusitania. Mr. Laurie has the superintendence of the engine-room as before, and Dr. Breeze is again medical officer. The duties of purser still pertain to Mr. Thos. Fox, and the comfort of the passengers was carefully seen to by him and Mr. Smart, the chief steward. From Mr. Fox prompt delivery was had of files and despatches for "The Argus." Concerning the voyage, it may be mentioned that the Garonne left London on November 26, and had to steam down Channel against W.S.W. gales, accompanied with thick weather. This delayed her arrival at Plymouth until 10 a.m. on November 28, passengers and mails were embarked, and the Garonne started on her voyage at 2 p.m. the same day. The same adverse gales and heavy sea continued

across the Bay of Biscay, and this troubled weather lasted until passing Gibraltar at 5 p.m. on the 2nd ult. Thence the weather was fine and pleasant. A stay of four hours was made at Naples on the 5th ult., and Port Said was reached at 8 p.m. on the 9th ult. After taking in coal the Garonne left at noon on the 10th, and cleared the canal at 6 p.m. on the 11th. Some 43s bags and packages of mails were received, and the voyage was resumed at 10 minutes past 9 p.m. same day. The run down the Red Sea was unattended with unpleasant sultry weather, and Aden was reached at five minutes to 11 a.m. on the 16th ult. A supply of coal was taken in, and at 7 p.m. same date the Garonne started on her long stretch of steaming direct to Adelaide. The trades in the Indian Ocean were only moderate, for once in a way, and there was no sea to speak of. Breaksea Island was passed at 10 minutes past 1 a.m. on the 24th inst., and strong N.E.W. winds and equally weather continued thence to Cape Bortia. Adelaide was reached at half-past 4 p.m. on the 7th inst., and after landing mails, passengers, and cargo for South Australia, a move was made for Melbourne at noon next day. Cape Otway was passed and signalled at 15 minutes past 11 p.m. on the 9th inst, but there was no response from the signal-station. Port Phillip Heads were entered at 5 o'clock yesterday morning. The Garonne was berthed quietly and quickly, and passengers were free to land with their light luggage. A special train was in waiting, and many of the passengers for Sydney took advantage of it to have a run up to Melbourne. The arrangements at the pier station for the disposal of tickets are altogether inadequate for the comfort of those desirous of securing them on such an occasion as the arrival of an Orient steamer. The rush and crush were something severe while they lasted, and the sight of scores of people straggling to get to a small pigeon-hole of a window indicated that there was a defect or a difficulty somewhere. The new arrivals did not express themselves as prepossessed in favour of their first experience of railway management in the colonies. The Garonne has a large quantity of fine woods to put out, and also a line of bulk ale of the new brew. After discharge of cargo for this port, she will leave for Sydney to-morrow, at the hour notified.

FAILED BUSINESS AND A NEW START

CLAUDE CORBYN RAWLINGS (-3, *BENJAMIN WILLIAM-2, BENJAMIN WILLIAM-1*)

Born 24 March 1844, Romford, Essex ENG.ⁱⁱⁱ; and died 5 March 1905, Towai, Bay of Islands, NZ.

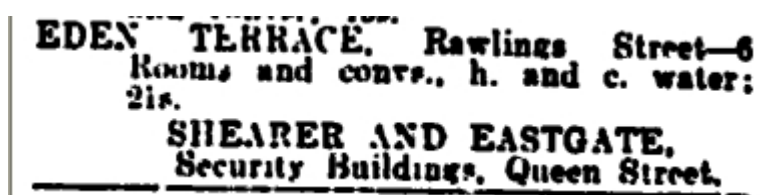

Upon arrival Claude and Reginald established themselves in Auckland, where they had various businesses, a non-alcoholic drinks factory was set up in Mt Eden area, but due to severe economic depression the business failed. There used to be a Cul-de-sac named Rawlings St. in that area as noted in the New Zealand Herald for 18 December 1917.



Because times were hard the brothers decided to travel North. Claude settling in Ruatangita near Whangarei where Harry (Harold) believes Geoff and Daisy were born. Later they moved further North and bought land at Towai, near the Bay of Islands. This was a farming district with several stores, a hotel and a church. The railway did not go any further than 20 miles north of Whangarei, after which you had to go by road. To find a doctor meant going to Kawakawa. The roads were terrible, mud knee deep in winter and in summer you could only travel by horse because of the dust. The men had to cut down the trees and split and sell them, and also build their homes from the ground up, learning as they went, without a carpenter's skills.

The Government of the day ruled that only land owners were eligible to work the very extensive gumfields. Their lives were extremely hard as the 50 acres was only sustenance farming. They could grow vegetables fruit trees and they had several chickens and a couple of cows. But the main source of income came from the sale of Kauri gum.

Claude only lived twenty more years after his arrival in New Zealand and died on 5th March 1905. It appears he had an obstruction in the throat and couldn't swallow any solids, more or less starving to death. He was sent to Auckland Hospital but no reason could be found. After his death Reginald asked for a post-mortem as they thought it might have been cancer. However, it was found to be a great clot of blood which had built up from continual coughing, caused by the bronchitis from which he had suffered. Harry was later told a fairly simple operation could have saved his father. Claude was buried in Towai with his son Benjamin William, who had fallen into the river while going to school and had died at the age of six. When the railway was put through Towai their tomb stones were put elsewhere. (Further research required)

Sarah was left with 5 young children, Harry the youngest only 8 months old. She left for Auckland, Geoff and Daisy going to school in Parnell and Sarah running a boarding house. But they eventually returned North. The property was sold to a person named Young. (Harry remembers it still being a poultry farm in the late 1920's.

The family later moved to a sharemilking job at Otatau near Waiuku and then to Alesbury not far from Waihou, for people by the name of Olway, who were well known in racing circles. From there they bought the lease of a farm at Bruntwood. Across the railway lines a family by the name of

“Tyler” lived and farmed. Daisy was married and living at Glenfield. The First World War was under way and her brother Geoff enlisted in the 3rd Reinforcement. During this time Sarah went to live with Daisy in Papakura, she died there on the 30 November 1917, being buried at Papakura Cemetery.

Geoff Rawlings arrived back from the war January 1919 on a Sunday off the “Oxfordshire” and went directly to Papakura and straight off to work with his brother Leonard for an employer named E. D. McLennan, but it wasn’t long before they left for the bush at Mamaku. Geoff and Ethel Tyler had continued their friendship during the years of the war. They were married at St. Peter’s cathedral in Hamilton on the 25th May 1920, allocated land at Otorohanga. For more of their story see the “Rawlings Family Register”.

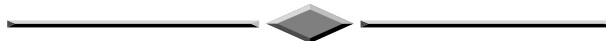

DEATH OF TWO HORSES

MOWING MACHINE NEAR HIVES

[FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT]

PUKEKOHE, Thursday

Two valuable horses on the farm of Mr. L. N. Rawlings, at Buckland, south of Pukekohe, died this week as the result of bee stings.

A neighbour, Mr. Douglas, was driving a mowing machine about half-a-chain from some hives when the bees attacked the team of horses viciously. Mr. Douglas attempted to free the team, but was severely stung about the head and had to retreat.

Mr. Rawlings called some neighbours to his assistance and they eventually rescued the horses by stunning the bees with smoking sacks. The heads and shoulders of the animals were by then a mass of stings, and, in spite of treatment by a veterinary surgeon, they both died.

OBITUARY

Pastor B. Rawlings

The recent death of Pastor B. Rawlings of the Pukekohe Revival Mission, saw the passing of a well known and respected Minister of the Gospel, who was called to the Full Gospel Ministry in 1932.

Pastor Rawlings was the son of the late Mr and Mrs Reginald Rawlings of Romford, London. He was born in the Whangarei district and educated at Maromaku School. After leaving school he took up farming, and at the age of 23 enlisted in the N.Z.R.B., and was, promoted to Sergeant (First World War). He served in action with the N.Z.E.F. in France.

After returning from the war Mr Rawlings took up market gardening at Otahuhu and Pukekohe.

While Mr Rawlings was serving overseas he met Miss Bertha Pardoe, youngest daughter of the late Mr and Mrs Percival Pardoe, and great-grand daughter of the late Mr Thomas Pardoe, of the famous Nantgaru Porcelain Works. Some years later Miss Pardoe came to New Zealand, and they were married on April 7 1931, at St. Andrew's Church, Pukekohe.

Mr Rawlings ministered in Pukekohe for several years, leaving later to minister in Wellington Gisborne and Christchurch, but returning to Pukekohe where he continued meetings in the Masonic and Oddfellows' Halls.

In 1950 Mr Rawlings was instrumental in building the "Pukekohe Revival Mission", a real work of faith. With the help of members of the church, he made roofing tiles, etc., and within three months the church was paid for.

Later, a manse was, built at the rear of the church section, and there Pastor Rawlings "passed away" on September 16 (1962).

In 1960, Pastor and Mrs Rawlings visited Britain with the intention of ministering there. He preached in the late Pastor Jeffries church and also held a campaign in Newport, London, but owing to ill health was unable to continue, and spent many months in the East Glamorgan Hospital.

After returning to New Zealand, though still in poor health, Mr Rawlings ministered for some months.

A memorial service was held in the church on a Sunday evening. It was conducted by Pastor S. A. Simpson of Devonport, who spoke of the faithfulness of Pastor Rawlings for more than 30 years in the Lord's service, and pointed out that from the time Mr Rawlings was called to the work of the Lord he was devoted to the winning of souls and proclaiming the glorious Gospel of the Kingdom.

The large attendance at the funeral, conducted by Pastors A. S. Simpson, Devonport; G. S. Rawlings, Christchurch; A. J. Chamberlain, Pukekohe; C. Mills, Stratford; and C. Harnett, Mt. Manganui—including many friends and relatives from different parts of New Zealand—and numerous cards, telegrams—beautiful floral tributes received were a testimony to the Pastor's work for the Lord Jesus whom he loved.

Pastor Rawlings is survived by his widow, Mrs Bertha Rawlings, and three brothers, Mr L. N. Rawlings, Otahuhu; Mr A. C. Rawlings; Whangarei, and Pastor Gerald Rawlings, Christchurch, and two sisters, Mrs H. (Dolly) Harnett, Christchurch and Mrs Greta Parker, Pukekohe.
